

Annual Procurement Report June 2023



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Introduction

Public procurement expenditure (at circa £3 billion per year) represents approximately 25% of the resources available to the NI Executive. It is therefore an important driver for our economy as well as ensuring goods, services and facilities are available to provide essential public services to citizens.

Public Procurement Priorities

In recent years the NI Executive has focused on not only delivering legally compliant contracts but also the economic and social benefits that can be achieved too.

Five Procurement Policy Notes (PPNs) have been approved by the Executive and can be accessed on the DoF website (external link opens in a new window / tab). The list of bodies to which PPNs apply can also be found on the DoF website (external link opens in a new window / tab).

The key areas of focus for the Executive's Procurement Policy include:

Social Value: Social value refers to wider financial and non-financial impacts on the wellbeing of individuals, communities and the environment. The policy of Scoring Social Value in tenders for public contracts requires the assessment of social value, as well as cost and quality with the balance between cost, quality, and social value tailored to individual contracts with all three considerations factored into procurement exercises above the threshold where the Procurement Regulations apply.

Supply Chain Resilience: In light of recent economic challenges and to ensure the long-term future of local suppliers the Executive identified the need to consider supply chain resilience. When it comes to economic growth, procurement policies that improve the management and resilience of supply chains are essential. Supply chains have been strengthened by:

- developing sourcing strategies aimed at shortening supply chains
- encouraging the use of alternative products manufactured/produced locally.

Human Rights: Decisions made in public procurement processes can have consequences on the human rights of people employed to deliver goods and services

through government contracts. Taking a risk based approach to incorporate human rights considerations in public sector contracts can help change the behaviour of companies competing for those contracts.

Procurement Policy Monitoring

To ensure the Executive's priorities are being met, it is critical that the implementation of procurement policy is monitored. The monitoring requirements for the five PPNs is detailed in the table below:

PPN 01/21 Scoring Social Value - Monitoring

The Policy of Scoring Social Value in tenders for public contracts requires the assessment of social value, as well as cost and quality with the balance between cost, quality, and social value tailored to individual contracts with all three considerations factored into procurement exercises above the threshold where the Procurement Regulations apply.

The Policy required that from September 2021 all contracts included measures to support fair work practices and ensure government contractors comply with relevant employment and equality law and maintain human rights standards. The Policy also required that from 1 June 2022:

- tenders for public contracts must include a minimum of 10% of the total award criteria to score social value; and
- the Living Wage is paid as a condition of contract for all tenders from June 2022.

PPN 01/21 sets out that Departments should score for social value using an outcomesbased framework which has four broad themes:

- increasing secure employment and skills;
- building ethical and resilient supply chains;
- delivering zero carbon; and
- promoting well-being.

From 1 June 2022 to 31 March 2023, 140 contracts scored social value. Suppliers and procurement practitioners have commented that the Policy on Scoring Social Value has elevated social value and placed it at the centre of public procurement in Northern Ireland. Feedback from suppliers shows they are embracing the delivery of social value. There has been a notable shift in the mind-set of suppliers since the introduction of PPN 01/21 to ensure they have the capacity to articulate social value ambitions within tender competitions and deliver on the same in the context of securing the contacts. Allied to this, there are numerous examples of suppliers investing resources to deliver social value through, for example, the recruitment of dedicated staff to a social value team. The positive impact that social value can deliver to address inequalities is also beginning to be captured through the Social Value monitoring system.

A summary of social value **delivered** on contracts that commenced in this time frame is provided at Annex B. Monitoring of the <u>delivery</u> of social value initiatives is provided by Contractors as agreed depending on individual contracts. As such, the monitoring will not show what contractors have committed to deliver and will only show what has been delivered. As most contracts are delivered over a long duration, it is expected that the full impact of scoring social value will not be clear for another few years.

Scoring Social Value - Lessons Learned

A review of the Scoring Social Value Policy in March 2023 identified the following lessons and potential improvements required to strengthen the implementation of the Policy:

Including social value in contracts can demonstrate real impact in terms of
opportunities to address inequalities, promote well-being and deliver environmental
benefits. The review indicated that scoring of social value at 10% changed the
award outcome in terms of the successful supplier in a small number of contracts.
 The data showed that in a small number of cases where the scoring of social value

- impacted on the award decision it resulted in an increase in the contract price or a decrease in the quality of service/ product secured through a contract.
- The impact of the low threshold for services contract needs further consideration,
 particularly considering the risk of disadvantaging micro-businesses and the
 requirement to not place unnecessary burdens on commercial teams of suppliers.
 In comparison, the relatively high threshold for construction contracts could result in
 large number of contracts at significant cost being tendered without social
 value. Contracting Authorities are being encouraged to include social value
 contract performance clauses on below threshold construction contracts.
- In keeping with this theme, the procurement rules also allow that contracts be
 reserved for certain types of organisations such as Voluntary Community and
 Social Enterprises/Mutuals to compete for and gain experience of delivering
 government contracts before being exposed to full competition.
- The Executive has also acknowledged that decisions made in public procurement processes can have consequences on the human rights of people employed to deliver goods and services through government contracts. Building on existing policy, current policy now mandates the actions that must be taken to incorporate human rights considerations into contracts when conducting a procurement process. Recognising that a human rights based approach to public procurement can be used to both prevent human rights violations and abuses and to take an active role in respecting, protecting, and fulfilling human rights.

PPN 02/21 Procurement of Social and Other Specific Services – Monitoring

Between 1 April 2022 and 31 March 2023 two contracts for social and other specific services were Reserved. This is a step forward in comparison to the previous year where no contracts were Reserved.

PPN 02/21 requires CoPEs to report details of any supplier complaints relating to the award of contracts for social and other specific services. From 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023, no complaints were received.

<u>Annex B</u> includes further details on contracts awarded for social and other specific services by CoPEs.

PPN 04/21 - Procurement Control Limits

eTendersNI is the tendering portal for NI public bodies which is used by 144 contracting authorities including Local Councils, Universities, Departments, Non Departmental Public Bodies and Centres of Procurement Expertise.

In 2022/23, the number of registered suppliers on eTendersNI rose from 26,406 to 28,618 and since 2015 a total of 14,221 contracts were awarded with a potential value in excess of £37 billion have been awarded through the system.

This report captures details of the contracts awarded by CoPEs. A list of CoPEs can be found on the DoF website(external link opens a new window / tab).

From 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023 CoPEs awarded 4,979 contracts with a combined awarded value of £3,248,927,330.

The table below provides a comparison with procurement activity reported by CoPEs in 2021/22 which shows a slight decrease in the number and value of contracts awarded.
